Daughter What a stink!

Daughter Mum, look!

The toilet's leaking!

Mother What's going on?

Go get someone from the estate office now!

Estate officer The toilet pipe's plastic casing has come off

and the soil drain is leaking

Mother Will it take long to repair?

But I have to remind you

Don't hang things on the pipes, like umbrellas

Overloading can easily damage the pipes

and dirty water will leak out

Presenter Sanitary and sewage fitments at home

can leak, get blocked, or give off bad smells

These may be the result of wear and tear

or of human factors

To prevent these things happening

ensure you use the fitments correctly

and do regular repairs and maintenance

Things like rubbish or cement from renovations

mustn't be dumped into the toilet

Don't pour corrosive liquids like acids into the toilet

Outlets of bathtubs, toilet and kitchen sinks

should have filters to prevent

things falling in and blocking the pipes

Pour diluted household bleach into floor outlets regularly

to prevent the trap from drying out

so bad smells and germs can't flow back inside

Taking these few simple steps

can ensure your sewage fitments work properly

Don't forget them!
