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New Moves



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Designed and built by the Hong Kong Housing Authority (HA), Diamond Hill Water Feature Park has received the Gold Award under Excellence in Public Development of the Hong Kong Institute of Landscape Architects (HKILA) Awards 2025, in recognition of HA's contribution to enhancing the quality of life and sense of well-being of the community.



The design and building team of the Park receives the Gold Award.

In an area of about 2.7 hectares, nearly half of the Diamond Hill Comprehensive Development Area, the Park offers a pleasant public open space. As a main vibrant recreational hub for the community, the Park integrates ecological landscapes, historical and cultural heritage, as well as recreation and leisure into the community life.





The core element of the Park – “water”, filtered from the sewage treatment plant, is channelled to the river of the Park and to Kai Tak River, nourishing the aquatic plants of the channel. The ideas of ecological preservation and sustainability are conveyed through the design of natural ecology.

Applying 3R – “Reuse, Recycle, Redesign” to promote historical conservation, the precious historic structures of the “Three Treasures of Tai Hom Village”, namely the Former Royal Air Force Hangar, the Stone House (the former residence of movie star Roy Chiao), and the Pillbox, have been preserved and reproduced in the Park.
