Message from the Director

Chinese New Year is around the corner! In my childhood days, year-end preparation was a most vibrant bliss in public housing estates. After the ritual "home cleaning", male heads of households would get their sleeves up to freshen up the metal gates of the flats with silver paint, while the housewives busied themselves in making all sorts of festival delicacies – peanut puff dumplings, sesame cookie balls, sweetened rice cakes, and classic dishes for the pre-new year family dinner. The aroma of the food wafting through the corridor was simply tantalising. Kids were of course the happiest reapers of all this culinary hard work as the home-made treats were often shared among neighbours.

Though neighbourhood interactions seem less robust nowadays, enjoying yummy food together is joyful as always. I would like to share with you my mother's recipe of Chinese radish cake. I learned to make this savoury steamed cake when I was Mum's little sous-chef in the kitchen, and still follow the same recipe now whenever it's time to bring this traditional snack to the table for Chinese New Year. My high school buddies, now friends for 40 years, meet up at my place every year to celebrate the occasion and, more precisely, to savour Madam Law's signature radish cake. It really is yummy! Do try the recipe below to make your own!

May I wish you all a healthy, happy, blessed and successful Year of the Dragon ahead!

Madam Law's Homemade Radish Cake

Ingredients:

White radish	3 600grams
Rice flour	1 packet
Chinese sausage	4 stalks
Chinese bacon	1 slab
Dried shrimp	20 grams
Dried mushroom	12-15 pieces
Sliced ginger	a few pieces
Chopped spring onion	to taste

Method:

1. Peel and grate the radish into fine strips (Optional to have some thicker strips, though I personally prefer fine strips to the full for a consistent texture).

2. Dice the Chinese sausages and bacon, pre-washed dried shrimps, and pre-soaked and softened dried mushrooms. Sauté all these in a small wok until aromatic. Add a suitable amount of soy sauce, Huadiao wine, granulated sugar and sesame oil, and sauté until aromatic.

3. Place a large wok over low heat, add sliced ginger and cook the radish until softened. Add a teaspoon of chicken bouillon powder to enhance the flavour (optional). Sprinkle ground white pepper over the radish. Remember to take the ginger slices out when the radish is cooked.

4. Mix the rice flour with a little cool water to form a paste. Add the paste bit by bit to the cooked radish, and keep stirring with a wooden spoon until well-blended. (Great workout for arm muscles!)



5. Toss the sautéed Chinese sausage and bacon, dried shrimps and dried mushrooms into the paste and mix well.

6. Pour the mixture into cake pans of your preferred sizes, and steam the cakes over medium to high heat for one hour. Be sure to replenish hot water to prevent the wok from burning.

7. When done, sprinkle chopped spring onion over the radish cake while it's still hot, and it's ready to serve.

8. The radish cake, if completely cooled, can be preserved in the refrigerator for 5 to 6 days. Cut it into slices and pan-fry until golden brown for serving.

Five Awards on BIM Honoured

The Hong Kong Housing Authority (HA) has recently received five awards from the Autodesk Hong Kong BIM Awards 2023 and the Hong Kong Institute of Building Information Modelling (HKIBIM) Awards 2023, in recognition of its effort and innovation in the exploration and applications of Building Information Modelling (BIM).

The HA has started to explore the possibilities of using Generative Design (GD) for architectural and structural applications, and has foreseen great potential in tapping into the power of artificial intelligence to optimise certain design aspects. Two initiatives, namely BIM-enabled Systematic Approach to Foundation Design (BIM-SAFD 2.0) and BIM-Generative Architectural Design Approach (BIM-SMAiRT), have been spearheaded. Both of which aim to enhance design efficiencies.
