Hello, I have a question for Gammon Construction's representative. As I remember, in the second case, there is a video after the accident took place. In the same case you just shared with us that you will use graphics to explain measures to frontline workers. My question is if measures like scaffolding can also be explained by means of animation or comic, instead of graphics? Is it because of the matter of cost or other reason that you use graphics?

I try to understand your question first. I think cost is not a matter of concern. In that case, using graphics is an easier way for frontline workers to get access, while more equipment is needed to play a video. If we convert those measures into graphics, or something we call trial or trial lifting, that means you can have a try, during the course we are able to evaluate the feasibility of our planned construction method and spot things that needed to be fine-tuned. I think making a video is fine as it can be handed down afterwards, or used for trainings and reports but we will do it later. So, do I answer your question?
